Legislative Lingo: Word of the Week

Presentation of Bills to Governor

The Governor has a limited number of days to sign or veto a bill after it is presented. The time limit differs depending on when presentment is made. If presentment is made during the first 83 days of a regular session, the Governor has only six days to act on the bill. Any bill presented during the last seven days of a regular session or after adjournment must be acted upon by the Governor within 30 days of presentment. All bills passed at regular or special sessions must be presented to the Governor no later than 20 days after adjournment. If the Governor does not act on a bill within the time period relative to its presentment, the bill automatically becomes law. Although there is no pocket veto in Maryland, it is very rare for a bill to take effect without the Governor's signature.

Bills passed by the General Assembly are signed by the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Delegates. Each bill is assigned a chapter number (in the order in which it is signed), and the bill becomes a part of the Laws of Maryland.

Bonus Lingo

Legislative Power to Override Veto

A three-fifths vote of the elected membership of each chamber is necessary to override a veto. If a bill is vetoed during a regular session, the veto is considered immediately. If a bill presented during or after the last six days of session is vetoed, the veto must be considered at the start of the next regular or special session of the legislature; however, during the first year of a new term the legislature may not override a veto.

It allows the County Executive to delegate the ability to require an interviewee to produce relevant documentation and allows the County Executive to delegate the release of interview transcripts of the appointee and destruction of transcripts for all other interviewees.

Maryland Bills To Watch

HB 16 Local Government Tort Claims Act – Notice

This bill extends to one year the time period during which notice must be given in order to bring an action for unliquidated damages against a local government or its employees under the Local Government Tort Claims Act (LGTCa).

Under current law an action for unliquidated damages against an entity covered by the LGTCa or its employees may not be brought unless notice of the claim meeting specific requirements is given within 180 days of the injury. Unless a defendant can show that its defense was prejudiced by lack of required notice, a court, upon motion or for good cause shown, may entertain a suit that does not meet LGTCa notice requirements.

The LGTCa defines local government to include counties, municipal corporations and Baltimore City, and various agencies and authorities of local governments, such as community colleges, county public libraries, special taxing districts, nonprofit community service corporations, sanitary districts, housing authorities, and commercial district management authorities.

The LGTCa limits the liability of a local government to \$200,000 per individual claim and \$500,000 per total claims that arise from the same occurrence for damages from tortious acts or omissions (including intentional

and constitutional torts). It further provides that the local government is liable for tortious acts or omissions of its employees acting within the scope of employment. It thus prevents local governments from asserting a common law claim of governmental immunity from liability for such acts of its employees.

This bill requires certain employees of utility facility owners, including contractors and subcontractors, to make certain efforts to determine if a resident is home and make their presence known before entering private residential property for certain purposes, with certain exceptions; requiring a certain employee of a utility facility owner to post a certain notice of a certain visit; requires certain employees of a utility facility owner to be clearly identifiable as employees of the utility facility owner; requires vehicles used by certain employees of utility facility owners to be clearly identifiable and display a phone number, subject to a certain exception; providing for the construction of this Act; defines certain terms; and generally relating to notice and identification requirements for employees of a utility facility owner.

SB 189

This departmental bill expands standing for the right to a contested case hearing on surface water discharge permits issued by the Maryland Department of the Environment. Specifically, the bill authorizes a person that meets the threshold standing requirements under federal law to request a contested case hearing on such permits.

Under current State law, a person may request a contested case hearing to appeal a final determination with respect to surface water discharge permits if the person makes factual allegations with sufficient particularity to demonstrate that the person is aggrieved by the final determination and the final determination is legally consistent with any provisions of law applicable to the final determination being challenged or based upon an incorrect determination of a relevant and material fact. Under Maryland common law, organizations do not have standing to assert claims unless the organization has its own interest, separate and apart from the interest of its members. In contrast, under federal law, organizations have standing to assert the interests of their members.
