Road salts can make it safer for us to walk and drive around in the wintertime. It helps keep roads open, and allows businesses, government, and social services to stay open with little interruption.

However, it only takes one teaspoon of salt to permanently pollute 5 gallor of water.

Salt seeped into the environment can:

- Raise sodium levels in our drinking water and increase treatment costs.
- . Harm fish, plants, and other wildlife
- Corrode vehicles, roads, bridges, and parking lots.

Since there's no easy or cheap way to remove salt from our environment, we can all do our part to be #WinterSaltSmart by following the below tips for snow and ire maintenance.

How should you prepare for a storm?

Shovels may be all that you need for winter weather in Northern Virginia. To make it easier on your back, you can choos shovel products with wheels. Remember to take breaks and avoid overloading your shovel with wet snow.

For big storms or to clear larger areas, snow blowers or other equipment may also be helpful. See below for a chart to decide which type of equipment to use depending on the size of the area that you need to clear (based on 2 - 3 inches of snow):

Sidewalk Clearing Equipment	Clearing Ability Per Hour
Shovel (2 ft shovel)	1,500 ft2 per hour
Shovel (3 ft snow pusher)	3,000 ft2 per hour
Snow Blower - (2 ft broom)	5,000 ft2 per hour
ATV (4 ft blade)	8,000 - 12,000 ft2 per hour
Skid Steer/Ventrac (4 ft broom)	10,000 - 21,000 ft2 per hour

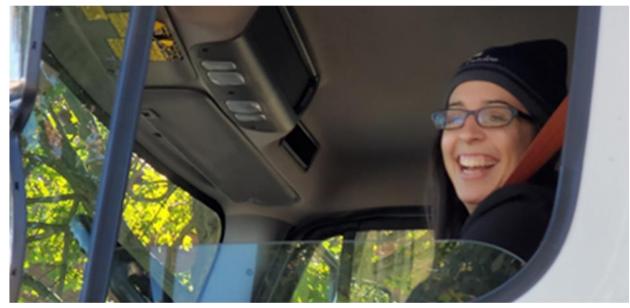

- 6. Staff Training Days (Snow Rodeo)
- All Loaded Trucks are Stored Undercover. All Snow Equipment is Washed and Cleaned Indoors.
- 8. Salt Barn & Goodhouse Keeping Policy
- 9. Contractor Salt Drop-Off Program
- 10. Post Storm Monitoring & Street Sweeping








Salt Watch

- Hosted Smart Salt Certification trainings for road salt applicators in Gaithersburg and MoCo










Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (COG)





- Shovel first! Clear snow from sidewalks and driveways before it turns to ice.
- Apply salt sparingly.
 There should be space between the granules.
 Piles and clumps are wasteful!
- A 12 oz coffee mug filled with salt is enough for 500 sq ft of driveway or 10 sidewalk squares!
- Sweep up excess salt after a storm. This can be reused!



As temperatures drop and winter weather moves in, neighbors rely on each other to keep their public walkways clear from ice and snow. Sometimes, road salt is necessary to prevent icy pavement. Are you a salt-savvy neighbor? Take the quiz below...

- I clear the snow from my walk as soon as possible
- I wait until after all the snow is removed to apply road salt

Did you know?

12 ounces of salt is the perfect amount for 10 sidewalk squares or a 20 foot driveway. Any more than that is ineffective, and unnecessarily harmful to humans, pets, plants, wildlife, and



- I only use salt when absolutely necessary
- I use only the amount of salt that is needed
- I spread salt evenly so that the granules are
- 1-2 inches apart
